
Notable Nashuans Map



THE NASHUA CEMETERY: NOTABLE NASHUANS BURIED THERE

Map Key	Notable Nashuan
1 III W 7	Daniel Abbot. Called "the father of Nashua" because of his leadership in establishing the Nashua Manufacturing Company. His home is a house-museum owned by the Nashua Historical Society. He sold an additional strip of land for the cemetery.
2 II W 7	Charles G. Atherton. Prominent lawyer and United States Senator from 1843 to 1849.
3 VII W 1	Albin and Alfred Beard. Alfred founded The Nashua Telegraph. Albin was an editor. Albin was also a mayor of Nashua, and an active member of the Unitarian Church, serving many years as Choir Director.
4 II W 5	Colonel William Boardman 1838. Prominent in Nashua affairs. Helped start the Indian Head bank. He was the engineer who supervised the building of the canal from Mine Falls.
5 III W 6	Peter Clark. Helped bring the railroad to Nashua.
7 I W 18	John Gray Foster. A Major General, he was the highest ranking officer in the Civil War from Nashua. Also served in the Mexican War. His statue stands around the corner from Nashua Cemetery in Foster Square.
8 II E 7	Charles G. Fox. Author of the first history of Nashua. Son-in-law of Daniel Abbot.
9 VIII E 1	Ziba and Ira Gay. Brothers who were important in setting up machinery for cotton mills. Ira was a mechanical genius.
10 V W 6 V W 5	Alfred and Ezekiel Greeley. Owned brick building on the site where the Hunt Memorial Building is now located. Both were influential in starting the Nashua Manufacturing Company.
11 IV E 10	J. Thornton Greeley. Donated Greeley Farm land to the City of Nashua in 1896 for what is now Greeley Park.
13 IV W 10	John M. Hunt. Prominent businessman, investor in the mills and the railroad and, at one time, Postmaster. The funds from his estate built the Hunt Memorial building and the Hunt Homes. His wife, Mary M. Hunt, and their daughter, Mary A. Hunt, (who never married) left money to the library as a memorial to John M. Hunt. Mary M. Hunt's estate funded the John M. Hunt Home and Mary A. Hunt left money for the Mary A. Hunt Home and the Unitarian Church.
14 IV W 10	Israel Hunt. Veteran of the Revolutionary War. Fought in the Battle of Bunker Hill.

15 IV W 2	Thomas J. Laton. Owned a large piece of land in the North End, parcels of which were sold for some of the present North End homes. Built the Laton House.
16II E 10	Colonel Leonard Noyes. Prominent businessman. Founded Nashua Lock Company. His gravestone on the northern edge of the cemetery has a lengthy inscription.
17 IV E 14	Charles F. Nutt. Leading merchant. Left fund in his Will for a hospital that was later used for the Nutt Surgical Wing at Southern NH Medical Center.
19 IV E 15	Isaac Spalding. Respected merchant. First Treasurer of the Concord Railroad. The Main Street Methodist Church restored his home.
20 I E 12	George Stark. Grandson of General John Stark, the "hero of Bennington." A railroad builder and manager of the Lowell & Nashua line. His home is the Italianate design house at Manchester and Concord Streets.
21 II E 4	Anna Stearns. The Unitarian Universalist Church of Nashua continues to benefit from the generous bequest of the Anna Stearns estate. She was an honored, long time member of the church.
22 III W 9	Aaron Fletcher Stevens. United States Congressman. Served in Civil War as Major of the 1st New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry, then as Colonel and Commander of the 13th New Hampshire Infantry.
23 VII E 1	Jeremiah W. White. Coal merchant and early pharmacist. Helped build the Merchants Exchange Building.
24 VII W 5	Bernard Whittmore. Editor of The Nashua Gazette, a rival paper to the Telegraph.
25 II E 2	Frances Winch. Local merchant and a founder of the Unitarian Church.
26-29	Mayors of Nashua buried in the cemetery: Jothom Otterson (26), Charles Williams (27), Albin Beard (28), Frank McKean (29).
30	Ministers' Lot. A lot was set aside for ministers. It includes Abby Gage, daughter of Rev. Minot Gage, the first minister of the Unitarian Church.
31 VI W 11	The Masonic Tomb was apparently built by a man named Murray for fellow Masons. The masonry is, appropriately, impressive.
